



### The New Geopolitics and South Asia's Trade Architecture

## **Objective:**

To organise a roundtable discussion to present policy-oriented proposals on South Asia Trade Architecture, given the rapidly transforming global and regional trade scenario.

#### **Background:**

South Asia today is the world's most populated region and its fastest growing in a sluggish global economy beset by multiple conflicts. This economic reality has turned the international spotlight on the region, and there are parallels between the current economic uncertainties and protectionism of the 1930s. This paper provides a critical analysis of South Asia's existing trade architecture and makes recommendations for closer regional economic integration. The recommendations provide the hope for the necessary political will to implement the proactive national and regional agenda outlined, which can change the lives of billions of South Asians.

The paper analyses the challenges and provides recommendations for the following four dimensions of South Asia's trade pattern and architecture:

- 1. Complex geopolitical developments like the Russia-Ukraine conflict; Middle East crises and tensions in the Taiwan Strait; the intense great-power rivalry between the U.S. and China; and India's bilateral relations with its smaller neighbours
- 2. Shift in China-centric global supply chains to South Asia which has led to a rethinking of the rules of engagement in international relations, bilateral economic ties and business.
- 3. Critical importance of regional energy connectivity and cooperation prompted by the dual threat of the climate change crisis and rising oil prices.
- 4. Effectiveness of regional institutions in supporting South Asia's trade and regionalism as the global economy witnesses a rise in protectionist tendencies, and growing worries about a trade war between major economies.
